

My dear People,

The Season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 11th. The word Lent is derived from the Anglo-Saxon word "Lenten," i.e., Spring, the time of lengthening days.

The word, therefore, describes a season of the year when the darkness has to yield up to the light some of the precious hours it has possessed throughout the Winter. Is not this an allegory of what Lent should be for us as Christians, a release from the frightful darkness of sinful, evil habits into the clear light of a light of righteousness, lived in obedience to the will of a loving God?

During the days of plenty many of us tried to show our mastery over self by denying ourselves certain pleasures or by abstaining from certain foods. There is now no need for us to make such Lenten resolutions, for the Government has enforced such abstinence upon us, whether we like it or not. We must, therefore, regard Lent in another way, not so much as an occasion for giving things up as for doing more. Our Lord did not go out into the wilderness primarily to deny Himself food and drink, nor to wrestle with temptation. His departure into the wilderness followed on His Baptism, when He heard a Voice from Heaven saying, "This is my beloved Son, in Whom I am well pleased."

He, therefore, went into the solitude to think out the full meaning of His Messiahship, to decide what His ministry must be, what form it should take, and to establish beyond all doubt what was His Father's Will. All who read this claim the name of Christian, but have all of us who claim to be Christians ever thought what being a Christian means? Make this your Lenten resolution: "Since I am a Christian, it is my bounden duty to learn more fully what the Christian teaching is, and to understand more clearly what it should mean in my life."

How many do make that effort? Lent means the retreat of darkness before the inexorable absence of light and in all of us there is great need for the darkness of our ignorance to be banished by the clear light of the knowledge of the Gospel. So many are imperfect Christians because they are ill-informed Christians with only a vague and scanty knowledge of God's will and purpose.

Is the Bible in your home merely an article of furniture, or is it the Book to which you turn to seek the knowledge of God? You cannot be a good Christian if you are not well-versed in your Bible.

Do you regard prayer as only a childhood practice which a man outgrows? The darkness that is within us will not give place to light until our prayers are as much a part of our life as are our meals. Do you think of your Church as something to be looked at from outside, to be supported by contributions sent-not brought, to be visited on rare occasions? No one claims that a man who does not go to Church is not a good man, but a person who stands apart from the fellowship of the Christian body is not a good Christian. The call to all Christians during this Lent is to a consideration of the questions: "Why am I a Christian? What does being a Christian mean? In what way have I fallen short as a Christian and as a member of Christ's Church?"

We read in the Acts of the Apostles that the followers of Jesus were called "Christians" first in Antioch, and that title was given to them not because they were like other men, but unlike them. One thing that distinguished them from other men was that "they continued steadfastly in the Apostles' teaching and in fellowship, in the breaking of bread and the prayers." Is this the distinctive mark of all those called "Christian" to-day? Can it be applied to you?


