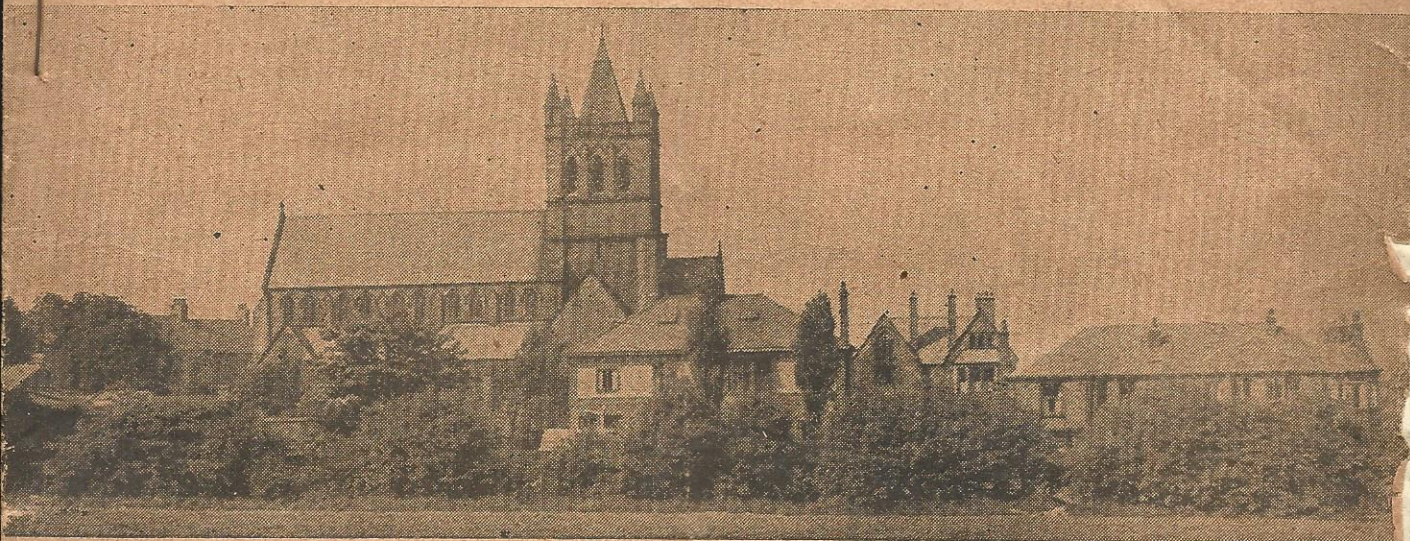

My dear Friends,

Twelve years ago I wrote in my Parish Magazine a letter headed "Watch and Pray." Quite unexpectedly it became front page news in the newspapers and brought me a considerable "fan" mail. The letters I remember best are those from (apparently) elderly women and a few men who wrote to tell me I was not doing my job—that my duty was to pray and help my people to pray. I could never understand why they jumped to the conclusion I was not doing so. What I wrote about was the duty of every Christian to watch as well as pray and that I considered Civil Defence (or as it was then A.R.P.) was a "watching" part of our Lord's command to Watch and Pray. I still believe this. I still believe it is the duty of every man and woman to do all he (or she) can to fit himself to face a material attack by Evil just as much as it is for all of us to put on the Spiritual "whole armour of God." And it is more important as a duty to our neighbour than for our own sakes.

If you have not done so it will pay to find out what jobs there are in Civil Defence. No matter what your ordinary work is you will find some branch of Civil Defence that is similar to your usual job, be it scrubbing floors (in the decontaminating rooms), or be it working on a switch board in the Control Room of the Fire Service.

Our great handicap in Barnsley is the last war. Dear old Barnsley was one of the jolliest places in England to come to on leave. Quite out of the war, but most people having a war job which brought people together in a way one doesn't get in, so-called, times of peace. There always seemed to be more of everything, to the visitor—money, petrol, food and entertainment, and the war seemed so far away. But we should be foolish to expect the same conditions again and just sit back and think "it won't happen to us." Let us pray that it never will, but are we justified in praying if we do nothing on our part to prevent it. We don't neglect the "watching" in other walks of life. If there is a case of small-pox in our neighbourhood we take immediate precautions as well as pray for our children. If we have a besetting sin we pray for God's help and also struggle as hard as we can against the evil and avoid temptation—do we ever just pray and do nothing. I hope many of our young people pray that, if it be best for them, they may pass a certain examination but they do not then close their books and think they need no more.

Well, the world is sick—a disease is spreading, an Evil disease—and it must be checked and the

United Nations have got to do it, but they cannot do it unless the common people, that is you and I, learn how it is to be done.

You can learn in many ways. Fire fighting, Hospital work, Rescue work, W.V.S., and what is usually mentioned last, the Special Constabulary. Perhaps less is said about the last because it is like the Royal Navy, the Silent Service of Civil Defence. It is trained in all branches of C.D. work. In the last six weeks there have been 120 hours of lectures in Civil Defence in Barnsley for this Service. So don't wait about signing until you hear of a start being made—work started long ago.

He who hesitates . . . . .

So in these days of world sickness, in the days of this war against the Devil let all of us soldiers of Christ arise and Watch and pray.

### Missionary Circle.

Again St. Andrew's Tide is drawing near and mention of it must perforce be made a month in advance.

As last year, the day, November 30th, will be observed in company with the whole English Church as a day of continuous Intercession on behalf of the work of the Church overseas. The society we support—S.P.G.—will next year be Celebrating its 250th birthday—1701-1951—250 years of evangelistic work made possible by the devoted prayers and sacrifices of countless Church people like ourselves. To-day the need is as great as ever, as immense spiritual opportunities are quickly opening out with the rapid penetration of civilisation into remote corners of the world, made possible by the development of transport of all kinds.

Many new workers are needed overseas. As our Lord said in His day: "The harvest truly is plenteous but the labourers are few. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth labourers into His harvest." That is our duty and privilege—to pray—so that we in our time may do our part in carrying on the work so devotedly done by our predecessors. "More things are wrought by prayer than the world dreams of," wrote Lord Tennyson.

So we trust all will take part in the day of Intercession. As last year you will find a chart in the Church porch with the day divided into quarter hours. Please put your initials—or any other mark—against the quarter for which you feel you can be responsible—more than one if you can manage it—and do not hesitate to put your mark alongside someone else's if there is no other vacant quarter suitable for you.

### The World-Wide Church.

*Notes and News from the S.P.G.*

Six men in six months have offered for service in Borneo. Thus the Bishop of Borneo's S.O.S. for priests—"Please send us at least three priests quickly"—has been answered. Four European priests have been doing the work formerly done by twelve. To-day, there are more men than money for their grants. A sympathetic administration desires to co-operate with the Church in the rehabilitation and Christian reconstruction of Borneo. Now with an adequate staff the Church can go forward, strengthening the faithful and taking the Gospel to an eager people.

#### BISHOP ON THE MOVIES.

On the 29th June the Rev. David Hand was consecrated Assistant Bishop of New Guinea at Dogura Cathedral, Papua. It was the first consecration the 3,000 Papuans attending the service had seen. Those who were absent would be able to see the Gaumont British "Movie" of the ceremony at the local cinema. The outstanding gift to Bishop David from the Papuans and white people was the Pastoral Staff. This was carved by Deacon Japhet, and is a beautiful piece of craftsmanship. The main motif is a pair of praying hands in the centre of the crook, and New Guinea flora is carved around the crook itself. The Orakaiva people gave money for the purchase of a beautiful, silver pectoral cross. The Waingela people gave topo cloth for a cope (decorated with New Guinea designs) and a mitre. *Fifty years ago the Papuans were head-hunting cannibals.*

#### Mothers' Union Notes.

The Official Deanery Welcome to the New Diocesan President, Mrs. Morris, wife of the Bishop of Pontefract, was held in the Arcadian Hall, at 3.45 p.m., on October 2nd, 1950.

Twenty-one of our members attended this gathering. It was a very well attended gathering; more than 350 members of the Mothers' Union were present. Canon Carleton, the Rural Dean of Barnsley, was in the chair, and his humorous remarks during the meeting brought constant smiles.

Mrs. Morris, our new Mothers' Union President, was then introduced to us. She explained to us that, unfortunately, she was not able to devote all her time to the Mothers' Union as she had many other interests in the Diocese and also home ties which must not be neglected—to this remark the Bishop smilingly agreed.

Our President said she would do her best and that she could depend on our support, co-operation and understanding.

Miss Morton had a few words with most of the Mothers. They wanted to see and admire her presentation brooch. After the meeting closed tea was served to ticket holders.—*Hon. Sec.*

#### MOTHERS' UNION ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting was held in the Vestry on October 2nd, 1950, at 7 p.m. The Vicar presided and opened the meeting with a short service. The enrolling member then gave her report on the year's work. Stating the monthly meetings had been excellent and we had had several very good speakers during the year and we had 80 members in St. Edward's branch. We had made gifts of fruit and flowers to several of our members when sick, many of whom were amongst us again.

We had through our efforts during the year got together enough money to pay for the new Mothers' Union Banner.

During the year two Jumble Sales had been held in the Parish Hall, the proceeds of the first, £29-5-0, being shared between the G.F.S., and we made £11-19-9 on a second sale later.

Sixteen Mothers went to London with the Mothers' Union and had a very nice two-day trip.

On September 26th, four of our Mothers attended a Quiet Day at Horbury and were much impressed.

The visit to Sugden's Shirt Factory proved very interesting to the Mothers who took advantage of the invitation.

The Vicar then referred to the accounts presented by the treasurer, Mrs. Schofield—the balance in hand at the end of the year was £21-10-6 plus £50 in the Bank for the Banner.

It was proposed by Mrs. Jenkinson, and seconded by Mrs. Wheelhouse, that £20 be given to the Church Wardens towards the cost of new surplices; the proposition was carried.

The enrolling member was thanked for her loyal services by the Vicar, who stated that every one should be satisfied with the past year's work, which had been very satisfactory in every way.

The following were nominated by the meeting to hold office for the ensuing year:—

Mrs. Townend was elected enrolling member, Mrs. I. Parkin was elected treasurer, and Mrs. L. Deighton as secretary.

A proposition was put to the meeting by Mrs. Pace, and carried unanimously, that six members be elected for the committee—three for two years and three for one year.

Mrs. Wheelhouse, Mrs. Fretwell and Mrs. Seargent, for two years; Mrs. Sawyer, Mrs. Penn and Mrs. Thawley, for one year.—*Hon. Sec.*

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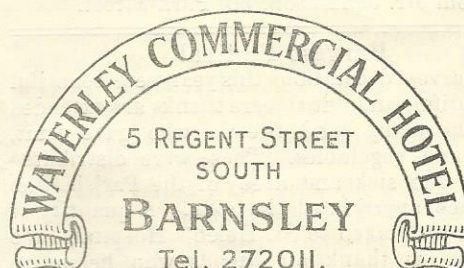
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
